


ONE HOUR PAST MIDNIGHT

BUSINESS LIGHTS-AUTOS-ACTIONT

The Point Richmond Business Association held its first short "Revival "meeting Monday, June 3, at the Point Orient Restaurant, to pick up the pieces for several projects started last year. Primary attention was given to the auto parking problem, and street lighting improvement. Plans for the Fourth of July celebration sponsored by the American Field Service were summarized by Judge David Calfee.

Plans for relamping and improving all old-style street lights in the City of Richmond were presented by Mr. Sturgeon, representative of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company. PG&E owns and maintains the street lights, and charges the City a month. ly rental fee of approximately \$4 per light. The new lamps being installed will increase light intensity, according to Mr. Sturgeon, and at the same time reduce slightly the monthly charges because of lower power consumption. The new lamps are of the modified mercury vapor-type -- an experimental one has been in operation on Washington Avenue for several months. The use of decorative lights in the business area of the Point was discussed briefly and tabled for further review. Repainting of all street light poles is scheduled for the very near future, and Mr. Sturgeon advised that the primary color to be used is grey; however, if PG&E is requested soon they will substitute a dark green paint, such as is on the poles now. Any preferences for color should be directed to Barbara Anderson -- Pablo Fanques Fair, upstairs in the Old Firehouse. (Please -- no candyapple red with white stripes.)

Status of plans developed last year to solve the present auto parking space problem was presented by Bob Barker and Ron Roselius. Considerable time and effort was spent by the Association and architect Frank Krueger last year in developing a brochure describing these plans in detail, for review and comment by all businesses on the Point, prior to discussions with the City of Richmond. Several changes in the plans were suggested and

are being reviewed. It was voted that a previous agreement with the Santa Fe Railway Company, for use of their land for parking should be acted upon soon. In order to expedite this project the Par ing Committee of the Association has scheduled a meeting next Thursday, June 13, beginning at 8 p.m. sharp, downstairs at the Point Orient Restaurant. Since some of the businesses at the Point apparently have not seen the brochure and were not advised of the June 3 meeting, the June 13 meeting will be open to all interested parties. Each business is being contacted separately and asked to be represented at the meet ing. Any questions or items for the meeting agenda should be directed to Ron Roselius - acting chairman (235-4222, or 233-4999), or Barbara Anderson, secretary.

In outlining plans for the July 4 festivities, now an annual event at the Poin Judge Calfee asked for any comments or criticisms on the operations of last year's celebration. Some minor items for improvement were noted. All businesses on the Point are being asked to stay open on the 4th if at all possible. A need for public restroom facilities was emphasized. Plans for this year's celebration are greater and grander than ever before (if that is possible). Free tickets for the prize drawings are already available through your local merchants.
