

Mike Lizarraga was an active, conscientious and concerned member of the Point Richmond

A past-president of the group, he was also their candidate to attend the statewide Youth Conference at Asilomar.

Mike had outstanding leadership ability, and yet he was the kind of unassuming individual who could be counted on, but demanded little in return.

He was well-liked by all who knew him-dependable and friendly and noted for his pleas ant smile.

Sportsmanship, another attribute possessed by this boy, was enjoyed by his teammates on the Harry Ells Swimming Team, He played tennis, and liked motorcyclin

The recreation leaders counted on Mike as one of their most active and dependable members in the Teen Center. He was anxious to return to join the group, and wrote to one of the leaders on April 2, 1969, that he had only seventy-five more days to wait.

School, starting in
1959 (when he was
in the sixth grade),
went on to Roosevelt
Junior High School,
and attended Harry
Ells Seni or High
School, from which
he graduated in 1965.

Mike was an active member of Our Lady of Mercy Church.

His casket, draped with the American Flag, was carried to San Bruno, to lay in rest with other Americans whose lives were lost in battle.

His death was heroic, and the majestic, solemn military funeral followed by the shattering twenty-one gun salute, and the quiet under-

stated Taps, played by a young soldier, brought everyone to tears.
For a few moments on that clear day, the sky clouded and it rained.

Because those who knew him will remember his friendly nature, his happy outlook, and his great interest in teen activities, a memorial will be placed in the new recreation center, in his memory.

May 19, 1914.....

NEW SPEED LAWS OF

"The new ordinance regulating the driving of automobiles on the streets of Richmond was passed by the council last night and is now the law of the city.

"Its provisions are drastic,
and unless auto
drivers are
careful they will
find themselves in
the hands of the police.

'Here are the regulations in a nutshell:

Speed Limit

"On Macdonald, Nevin and Bissell, between First and Twenty-third Streets, not greater than fourteen miles per hour. The same speed limit on Richmond, Park and Washington Avenues.

"On other streets of the city not greater than nineteen miles, except in sparsely settled sections when you can go twenty-five miles an hour.

"Must not turn on streets except at corners, and at end of the thoroughfares.

"In crossing streets slow down to nine miles per hour.

"No automobile or wagon allowed to stand within sixty feet of the corner of Sixth and MacDonald Avenue."

"WASHINGTON SCHOOL STUDENTS DEBATE ON THE CONSCRIPTION BILL"

(May 19, 1917....)

"A debate in which pupils of the Washington School took an enthusiastic interest was staged yesterday afternoon when the conscription issue was discussed with Carolyn MacQuiddy as captain and Irene Donnleworth and Ridgley Greathouse as assistant and the affirmative and Clarence Ford as captain and Stanley Pressler and Francis McLaughlin as assistants for the negative."

"KOZY KOVE IS MECCA SUNDAY"

May 21, 1917....

"Many Richmond people took advantage of the warm sunshine yesterday for an outing at Kozy Kove. Children played in the sand while the adults enjoyed themselves dancing in the pavillion. The Len-

zen and McCracken orchestra furnished the music for the dancing.

Kozy Kove will be open all season and the Lenzen-McCracken orchestra will be the official musicians."
