


meeting our board of directors will be elected.

Seniors and all Californian's should keep alert to Senator Petris, Senate Bill 36, "The Right to Health Care Act" that is currently successfully working its way through the Assembly and Legislative Committees in Sacramento towards Governor Wilson's desk. It is a health care bill that is backed by a group called Health Access and is a bill that is patterned much like the Canadian Health Care Plan with California modifications. I hope to give you a detailed report on this bill at the next writing and ask now that you be aware of it for the sake of your own health care needs. This group called Health Access has been working with Senator Petris on such a health care bill for some years and feel now that they are getting close to a good bill that will cover all Californian's with Health Care. If this bill fails to meet with Governor Wilson's approval this term, Health Access will proceed with an Initiative for the next election ballot.

On a different subject, How are your muscles? Are they weak, inflexible and stiff causing you difficulty in keeping your balance?

Accidental falls are the most prevalent cause of injury in older persons. Cheer up because muscles are not doomed to decay. Half of their functional loss is due to lack of use! Even frail persons in their 80's or 90's can greatly improve their muscle strength, agility and balance. All persons should exercise all of the major muscle groups two to three times a week with special emphasis on the muscles in the legs, knee and ankles. The better that your body can support you the less likely you are to fall and break a bone.

Consider this: if you average step is less that 16" in length you are considered at high risk of loosing your balance and falling. Increase your stride to 24" or more to be safer and more steady on your feet. Exercise, for muscle toning then is a very good idea! Everyone can do it! Lets stay on our feet everyone! If you have access to a video machine there are several very good tapes available now, especially for seniors that concentrate on helping you to regain your muscle tone, and best of all they are fun to follow!

Ahh, humor tested! Humor





Childhood Memories of The Point Richmond Triangle

William L. Thompson, often called Louis by his friends, was born in Point Richmond on February 17, 1909, lived on Scenic Avenue. graduated from Richmond Union High School and was the first native Richmondite to go through medical school. Dr. Thompson began his practice in 1940 at 9th & Macdonald, later moving to 32nd & Macdonald until that building was sold at which time he moved to an office on Broadway. In 1979, at age 70 and after 39 years, he retired officially from medical practice. However, his many loyal, local patients continue to call him for advice.

Thanks to Dr. Thompson for his valuable contributions to our archives.

"The triangle formed by Washington Avenue, Park Place and Richmond Avenue was, from the beginning, the business center of Point Richmond. My early memories start about 1913. There are still many similarites but the personnel was then quite different."

The old Anderson Hotel, the three story building east of Whiteside's is very old. As with most business buildings of the triangle, the upper floors were rooms for workers. The street floor here was occupied by the McWhorter's grocery one of the very early grocery stores in the town. It was run by Beecher McWhorter. I remember it well having shopped there many times with my mother.

Further east on Richmond Avenue was a large wooden building which was the site of a competing grocery operated by Julius Stiefvater. We knew both of these grocers and shopped in both stores. In the building above was the meeting place of the Odd Fellows lodge. My father was a member of the Odd Fellows and my mother was a member of its associated lodge for women, the Rebekahs. This lodge was very popular in the mother lode country in post gold rush days and my father joined it there.

Between McWhorter's and Stiefvater's stores were several smaller buildings one of which was the office of Bob Dornan's Richmond Supply Company. Bob immigrated from Ireland and settled in Richmond in about 1905. Shortly he established his supply company which served a very important local need. He had warehouse facilities out near the Santa Fe where he kept his stores of hay, feed,

grain, wood, coal and other materials. Bob was a large powerful man who delivered supplies by himself all over town. First he used a horse and wagon and later obtained an old odd looking truck. I remember Bob climbing up our long steps carrying on his back a huge bale of hay or sack of coal or grain apparently with little effort. His wife Trannie ran the office for him. The Dornans were very good friends of our and they and their family were very prominent and valuable citizens in early Point Richmond.

There were other businesses in this block. I recall a real estate office. I think that one of the locations of Chris Machado's barber shop was in this area. His wife had been one of the earliest grammar school teachers in the Richmond-San Pablo area. One of his daughters, Evelyn, was my office nurse and assistant for many years.

Another building between Stiefvater's and Tunnel Avenue, housed the old post office. This was a two story building with rooms above. In about 1940, shortly after I began medical practice here, I was called to see a small elderly man in a room here. It was said that at one time he had been boxing champion of the world in one of the lighter weight classes. Unfortunately, I cannot remember his name.

The old post office had a


great bank of hundreds of post boxes. In early days there was no home delivery of mail and most residents rented boxes. Others and the transients used general delivery. Even later when delivery at home had been instituted it did not include people on the periphery of the town so they retained their boxes. Almost daily one of our family stopped in for the mail. I recall that our original box number was 696.

Next to the post office was a shoe repair shop where we occasionally had repairs done. However in those days most people did their own shoe repairs. At home we had various sizes of shoe lasts, awls and other tools for shoe repair. We used the leather from old discarded machinery belts for the soles. It worked fairly well.

The Hover family operated this establishment. Mrs. Hover, the restaurant and rooming house and Mr. Hover, the saloon.

Arthur Hover was
my best friend, we both
attended Washington Grammar
School, and we both belonged to
the Stag Patrol of the Boy
Scouts. Arthur had to work
after school making beads,
etc., before we could play and
I would sometimes help him. If
you think an army sergeant is
tough on bed making, you should
meet Art's mother! Mrs. Hover
was a great cook, I used to beg
my parents to take me there to
eat, but it was always NO!

The Hover story is interesting. They were displaced by the '06 Quake in San Francisco. The story goes, that they paid a man \$100 to row them across the bay, landing at the Point,

where they settled. Mr. Hover later sold out and bought a prune ranch in Cloverdale. This was a great place to visit, beside the great family orchard of various fruit trees and the cow that gave such rich milk and cream, the back boundary of the ranch was the Russian River where the



swimming was great.

I am sorry to say that I lost track of Arthur until years later. Jean and I had climbed to the top of Mount Lassen, and were signing the register there, when who should we meet, but Arthur Hover!

Arthur was a school teacher, starting out way us on the California coast, teaching Indian and rancher's children in a tiny school. MEMORIES

At one time Standard Avenue was a boardwalk on the west side from approximately Washington Avenue to the Standard Oil Refinery Main Gate. The street was very muddy in those days. Later sidewalks were put in.



Mrs. Casey had the news stand before the Andrews. She was a widow and ran the business. She had delivery and sales of the newspapers in the Point. She had three sons, John, Joe, and Stanislaus and a daughter Mary. Mary worked many years for the City of Richmond. Mrs. Casey's store was next to the Colonial Hotel, now the Mac.



Willard mentioned getting snowcones next to the Point Theater, that was at Charlies' where there was a penny slot machine.

Louie Thompson forgot to mention Garfinkles' store. They moved to Macdonald Avenue in Richmond. At that time the Point looked pretty bad for retail stores.

At one time there were two bakeries in the Point. One was located on the corner of Richmond Avenue and Santa Fe Avenue. The other was the Torino Bakery on Standard Avenue, it was owned by Mr. Rollino, Irene's father. We used to like to watch the baker make doughnuts, he gave us a handout

occasionally, they were great!

Also there were five groceries in the Point, Steivauter on Richmond Avenue, Chasseur Bros. on Standard Avenue, Tony Mazza on Standard Avenue (later on Washington Avenue), Sheeline's on Standard and Castro Sts, and Sutich on Tewksbury and Standard, then later Whitesides'.



Chasseur's Store and the Torino Bakery burned down, the building was replaced by a new concrete building, it included a garage run by a person named Ed and a person named Calandra.



My father Louis Bernes had the laundry next to Chasseurs's grocery. He bought the laundry in 1912 from Mr. Bellegarde and Mr. Bernet. That was when we moved to Point Richmond, from San Francisco. In the later years my frother and I ran the laundry routes in the Point and in Richmond. That is one of the reasons I knew so many people in the Point.

I plan a visit to the Point sometime in June. I hope to get to see some of my old friends and reminisce about the "good old days" in the Point.

POINT METHODIST CHURCH HISTORY

The minutes are printed as written. This is the 55th installment.

Jan 12, 1917

6 Ladies names as members. 10¢ dues by Mrs. McYuffin Box of Assorted Fruit and Jelly sent to Ellen Stark Food Home. Valued at \$13.05. Expressage .52.

New members Mesdames Neville, Mitchell, Maynard, Weston, Owens and McYuffin.

Jan 19, 1917

Meeting of W.H.M. Society held at parsonage and opened by President Mrs. Adams. Scripture lesson the 92 Psalm read. Prayer by Mrs. Gillette. Minutes approved as read. Mrs. Adams reported she had a card from Mrs. Lincoln, Supt. of Ellen Stark Ford Home that the box of Fruit had been received and expressing thanks for same.

A motion was made and carried to have Secretary write Mrs. Dearborn and ask her to attend our next meeting and give us an address.

Mrs. Gillette led the study course and a profitable and pleasant hour was had. Received dues from
