



We welcomed Jean Eakle, Anne Brown and Bob Cheyne as church members on December 17. Hooray! I am glad to be part of a group they would choose to join!



One church group in the 1920's was the SOCIAL LEAGUE of the first Methodist Episcopal Church whose history is reflected in their minutes printed below and taken from the canvas covered, red leather cornered notebook which cost \$1.15. The minutes are printed as written. This is the 49th installment.

#### May 4, 1926

Social League met in the Church parlors with 13 members present. Mrs. Dicely and Mrs. Dingle were the hostesses. Social League was given credit for \$30 paid to the church from the calendar month.

Tea Committees were appointed and it was moved, seconded and carried that the Tea be held the 18th of May. Each member having the privilege of inviting four guests.

The Fellowship dinner for the 4th of June was discussed and it was decided that the League would give it if the absent


members were in favor.

It's hard not to notice the baby boom that's occurred in Point Richmond in the last few years. Strollers regularly navigate sidewalks and streets, weekly the Storytime at the Westside library is packed, and on sunny afternoons Janice Playlot is teeming with little ones and their parents. Just over two years ago, a group of mothers gathered together to address the need for connection and support for families with young children. We created the Point Richmond Association of Moms, or PRAM.

What is PRAM? volunteer-run A organization, we aim facilitate to information- and resource-sharing, foster contribute friendships and to improvements in the larger community. Through its many activities, we believe that PRAM enriches the lives of our children and helps us to be better parents. In two years we have grown to over 80 families, from Point Richmond, Brickyard Landing, Marina Bay and beyond.

Our activities include monthly meetings, playgroups, social events and outings, a

newsletter, community outreach and service programs, and advocacy on issues important to children and families. We are committed to serving all parents and young children in the area and helping our community to become more familyfriendly. Here's a sampling of what we're up to:


**Community Events.** After the annual Tree-Lighting at the end of November, PRAM co-sponsored with the Point Richmond Business Association and Neighborhood Council, a festive reception and toy drive kick-off at the Community Center. The holiday food and drink and creative craft activities engaged adults and children alike. We were gratified by the enthusiastic attendance and generous contributions to the toy drive. We look forward to helping with the planning of other events such as the Point Richmond Stroll.

**New Preschool.** On January 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2001 a new preschool opened in Point Richmond, on the grounds of Washington Elementary School. It promises to provide exciting learning experiences for 3 to 5-year olds and valuable early childhood development

education for parents. Members of PRAM have been working with local school district officials to develop this innovative program, which will provide a stimulating, nurturing environment for children from diverse economic backgrounds. The Point Richmond preschool program could serve as a model for other public-private collaborations across California.

It has been over 15 years since a school for young children operated in the Point (From the mid-70s to mid 80's, Lynette Pease operated a preschool in the Washington Field House.) The community has already stepped forward to help ensure this school is successful. The Business Association has joined PRAM in making financial contributions to support start-up costs, through the Many Hands Project. The additional furnishings and materials provided through such contributions will help the teacher create and maintain a warm, well-equipped learning environment for our community's children.

I was born in Richmond Cottage Hospital. We lived on South 8th Street, a half-block off of Cutting Boulevard. We were a hop and a skip away from the Kaiser Shipyards. My father worked next door to them at Richmond Navigation on tug boats with Captain Lauritzen.


I know they did their regular "tug boat work", but during World War II, something else was going on. In the middle of the night, 2, 3, 4, AM the telephone would ring. It was always Capt. Lauritzen and they always had to make a "run" from San Francisco to Vallejo for the Navy in the dead of the night. Why? To the day Dad died, he would not say.

I am guessing, but I think it was because of Capt. Lauritzen and Dad's undercover work (whatever it was) that we were given front row seats to every launching of every victory ship. Can you imagine a tiny four or five year old standing next to a huge, huge ship? Watching some celebrity with the champagne bottle crush it on the bow? But the most exiting was watching each ship slowly go down their "slide" into San Francisco Bay and watching the waves, hearing the lapping of the waters. Such huge monsters letting go free into the open sea, to carry 18 and 19 year old sons who defended our country, perhaps to die.

Many, many years later, I met and married my Wade. He told me about his induction into the Army. It was the Korean War, They were put on a ship, sent "below" and there on the inside of the ship's wall, someone had painted in white, "This god-damn ship was built in Richmond, Calif. I hate Richmond, Calif."

It was that white painted relief from someone that kept my husband from getting sea sickness, sitting in the bottom of the boat, rolling and rolling all the way to France...... not Korea?

Life needs humor. I have it, and my husband sure had it.

May I express to each of you my sincere appreciation for your faithful performance of duty in maintaining a successful drive by which you delivered four C-4's in March, and for your sustained high production level which has earned you the commendation of the United States Maritime Commission.


Typically American was the manner in which you adapted yourselves to a job when your services were most urgently needed. You went to work with a will, and all Americans are proud of the record you Americans have established.

You could never have achieved your goal without the driving spirit of patriotism which caused many of you to uproot yourselves from other parts of the country and to proceed here where you could best help win the war. I how that you are thankful for the opportunity to grow strong and taste the fruits of industry and accomplishment. The whole world knows that you have thrown your strength into the scales of war, not alone to defend those traditional freedoms of the past, but to guarantee the new promises of the future.

The great ships of our Navy would remain idle on the drafting boards were it not for the toiling hands of the workers who build them. And the treep transports, which mean victory to landing parties against enemy fire, would remain a marine architect's dream were it not for the flesh and blood workers, the men and women of this shipyard, who have deservingly won the plaudits of a nation. May I express my personal thanks for your loyalty, your great effort, and your outstanding success in overcoming all obstacles.

## A Review by Marjorie Harmon

PTCASSO AT THE LAPTN AGILE opened at the Masquers January 19th and will run through February 24th. Steve Martin's oneact play is a witty celebration of the 20th Century that features two geniuses of our time: Albert Einstein and Pablo Picasso. The play is set in 1904, the beginning of the new century, and the place is the Lapin Agile, a neighborhood bar where patrons meet to discuss life, men, women, and what the future will bring. A young man of 25, Albert Einstein, joins in with the repartee. Later,

another young man, Pablo Picasso, joins the group. Both are on the verge of achieving greatness, and as they meet they spar over the merits of art and science.

The Masquers give a fine, ensemble performance that carries the humor along at a fast pace. Philosophy flows with charm and wit in their production. Within this talented group, there are performances of special note: the dry brings to the role of Germaine, the waitress. Ben Ortega's Picasso is a figure of passion and wit, while Timothy Beagley brings warmth and lightheartedness to his role.

But what of the 20th Century? What great events will occur? What geniuses will arise to leave their mark on the world? What will its hallmark be? They author says that in the 20th Century, "the accomplishments of artists and scientists outshone the accomplishments of governments".

For an enjoyable evening, this is a production not to be missed.



#### **NOVEMBER 2000 ELECTION**

Nationwide, voter turnout in November was 105,380,929 ballots cast or 51.2 percent of those eligible. This was significantly lower than the 62.8 percent who voted in 1960. The 2000 election had one of the lowest turnouts.

George W. Bush, "secured" the Electoral College majority required to be the 43rd president, but lost the nation's popular vote to Al Gore by 539,897 votes according to a final vote tally compiled by a nonpartisan research group from state reports. Republican Bush received 50,456.167 votes and Democrat Gore drew 50,996,064. Slightly more than half of 1 percent of the overall vote count separated them. Green Party candidate Ralph Nader had 2,864,810, Reform Party Pat Buchanan took 448,750 and the remaining 34 vote-getters drew the rest.

Based on reports of total ballots cast in 34 states and the District of Columbia, there was an estimated undercount of 2.1 million ballots nationally. The undercount includes those who did not vote for president but voted for other offices and ballots that were discarded.




Kenny's father owned the Kenny Pool Room on Park Place, which is now Little Louie's Deli.

Professional football is nearing the end of its season with the Super Bowl on January 28th. I don't remember any of the Richmond players who ever played in a Super Bowl, but do remember several who played in College Bowl games. I went to school with Bruno Banducci, Johnny O'Disio and Joe Vargas, who all played college and professional football. Larry Slagle from Point Richmond played in a Rose Bowl game for U.S.C. The late Frank Shock and Bob Hartnyk both Point people played in the Cotton Bowl for St. Mary's College.

From the book. Abundant Life. The which is a biography of Benjamin Ide Wheeler, who was President of the University of California at Berkelev from 1899 to 1919. "The participants in the game are not players but cogs in a machine. One man does all the kicking, two do all the carrying and the rest their specialized pushing. American Intercollegiate football is a spectacle and not a sport. If the element of 'gate money' were removed, the whole thing would



vanish away."

Football is not my favorite sport, especially after seeing two Point Richmond players, twenty years ago, playing in a high school game where one, David Giacomelli, playing for Salesian High was carried injured off the field, and our son Bryan Smith, playing for St. Mary's High was escorted off the field by the team doctor and the coach after being "sacked" pretty hard. I forget who won the game, Salesian, I think. Salisian High School was coached by Dan Shaughnessy, legendary high school football


coach, who is retiring after 25 successful years in the sport. Dan ended his career as coach at St. Mary's High School

Baseball season is over but spring training is fast approaching. I always wrote that Point Richmond had only one big league baseball player, Russ Christopher, who was in a World Series. Now, I have found out that Jim Cronin, born in Point Richmond, was on the Philadelphia Athletics in 1929 when they won the World

Series, beating the Chicago Cubs four games to one. I obtained this information from Point Richmond's Jack Healy, a relative of Jim Cronin. Jack does not know what happened to Cronin's World Series ring.

Incidentally, Jack may write a column for our PRHA's "This Point...in time". Jack Healy's family has a long history with the Standard Oil Company. Relatives worked for the company when it was known as the Pacific Oil Company located in Alameda before moving to Point Richmond.

Les Allen writes for the Oakland Tirbune every other Saturday. One of his columns was titled "Baseball Makes for Great Memories". I will be using some of his material if our congenial editor Gary Shows will let me continue writing. I'm always a week late with my contribution which makes his work more difficult. By the way, did you read his letter in the West County Times? Very interesting-he should write more for our TPIT. Anyway, back to Les Allen, he wrote about baseball cards which were very popular in his time, the early thirties. In grammar school we would gamble with the cards that featured pictures of baseball players by sailing them against the wall at about a distance of 15 feet. The guy whose card same closest to the wall was the winner and gathered up all the losers cards. I quit playing when it was discovered that some did that was always winning because on the back of his card he placed a coat of wax which made it easy and accurate to sail. Not bad for a grammar school future entrepreneur.

Enclosed is a picture of a ship captioned: "U.S.S. General J.H. McRae, built by Kaiser Company, Inc., Richmond, California." This picture was given to my father, W. Ira Rentfro, along with the enclosed letter, from the "Office of the President", with the signature of Henry Kaiser. Notice the letter reads, "To the Men and Women of Yard Three", and is dated June 15, 1944. My father worked as a shipwright at Shipyard Number Three in Point Richmond, from May 1942 until the shipyard closed. After that time he was employed at the Richmond Hospital for 12 years. He made his home in Richmond the last 51 years of his life, and he lived to be 103 years of age, 8/7/1890 to 12/23/1993.
