
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


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Church News



We celebrated Pride Sunday on June 6. Our congregation is a member of Reconciling Ministries Network, and supports full human rights, within the church and in society, for people who identify as LGBTQ. Pat Dornan decorated the display window that faces West Richmond Ave and the sanctuary with rainbow colors, and worshipers could glimpse the joyful trappings via Zoom. We appreciate the societal acceptance already achieved by the LGBTQ community, and hope and work for a better future for all.

Rev. Cornel Barnett, retired Presbyterian pastor who resides in Point Richmond, was our guest preacher Sunday, June 20. Cornel presented perspectives on "moving forward" and left us uplifted and challenged. We are always pleased when he and Suellen Barnett join our worship.

The California-Nevada Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church ordained Rev. Jacey and Rev. Emily Pickens-Jones as elders on June 27. The ceremony took place at St. Mark's UMC in Sacramento, the church where Rev. Emily's dad, Rev. Alan Jones, is pastor. Rev. Jacey's parents, Amy and Barry Johnson, who live in Pennsylvania, were able to attend in person. They brought two grandchildren along to witness the milestone event. Ordination was live-streamed, so we were all able to be there, too, without

driving to Sacramento. It replaced our usual Sunday morning worship service. Congratulations to Jacey and Emily! We are proud of our pastor!

A few select souls met at noon, July 14, for cleaning day at the church. We kept our regular housekeepers on payroll during the pandemic, so certain areas of the church were already clean. However, after a variety of painting, repair, and restoration projects, as well as wildfire smoke and windstorm dust, tables and surfaces were left with a layer of grit. Volunteers distributed our several songbooks, hymnals, and Bibles in the pews and racks and the kitchen got a good wipe-down. Alice Thompson played both well- and little-known hymns on the piano as a soothing soundtrack for our work. We organized the middle Sunday school room and set up furniture in Friendship Hall to prepare for Vacation Bible School. Fran Smith dropped in to donate towels and bestow and collect hugs. Thanks to Barbara Haley, Doreen Leighton, Rev. Jacey Pickens-Jones, Thompson, and Alice Thompson for their efforts!

We met together at the church the week of July 26-30 for Vacation Bible School. Eight children celebrated "The Power of Story." Rev. Jacey studied youth ministry, and knows all the best games to play. She is an awesome storyteller. Alice Thompson came to accompany our singing on her guitar every morning, the first time she has participated since she retired. We were thankful for her talent and sparkle! She was deemed "just like Johnny Cash" by one of the children. Bethany Hayter led spirited songs and taught us all the actions. We all discovered new muscle groups after singing with her. Bill Thompson shepherded the kids through the cycles of the day, from welcome, stickers on the roll sheet, nametags, singing rounds, art, games, and farewell. As always, Bill gets a gold star in kindness and as a corn "shushing" relay judge. Barbara Haley brought her granddaughter and kindly supplied birthday cake for snack to celebrate my day. Linda Andrew-Marshall brought farmers-market-fresh strawberries and animal crackers for snack. Debbie Benko came on her days off to help the kids with art, snacks, and camaraderie. Norm Reynolds single-handedly prepared lunch for families and staff on Friday; Janie Amdal brought homemade cookies. Art was all about the process: different-colored inks bled together on coffee

filters to make butterfly wings, tempera paint pressed between folded paper made mirror-image blobs, modeling clay and commercial stamps formed ink-stamp art, and heads colored in crayon sported watercolor hair blown in place through a straw. Our amazing children and their families made the week a success. No child cried. No child quarreled with another. People shared their feelings, felt heard, and worked through their emotions together. It was remarkable. It made my heart sing to be back with families in community.

Vacation Bible School was our first inperson event meeting inside the church since the pandemic started, and we thought it would be a precursor to in-person worship starting in September. Staff and children wore masks while inside the building. Many of us wore them outside, too, except during snack time and lunch on Friday. On the Wednesday after VBS ended, Rev. Jacey, although fully immunized, got a positive Covid test result, coupled with high fever and other symptoms. No other volunteers tested positive, but it was a sobering development. Rev. Jacey had to abort her plans to visit family in Pennsylvania: she and Emily deplaned, rented a car, and drove home from Phoenix after they received the positive result. With the easy transmission of the delta variant, we hesitate to resume worship in the sanctuary, and plan to worship some Sundays in September gathered outdoors in the labyrinth garden combined with online streaming. During Rev. Jacey's recovery from a breakthrough Covid infection, Jean Reynolds preached August 8 about the Filipino people and stories of their current struggle to have a government that recognizes their basic human rights. Thousands of Filipinos have been killed as a "solution" to illegal drug use, and human rights advocates have been red-tagged as communists or terrorists, including church leaders. Rev. Lindsey Bell-Kerr, pastor at Christ Church UMC in Santa Rosa and a campus minister, pre-recorded a sermon we heard August 15 on the gift and art of listening.

We continue to provide dinner monthly for guests at Greater Richmond Interfaith Program

(GRIP). In June, Linda Andrew-Marshall shopped and delivered the food; Debbie Benko provided food in July and August. At the end of June, families moved from Hilltop hotel lodging, where they had more personal space during the height of the pandemic, back to the family shelter on 22nd Street.

Pat Dornan and Barbara Haley collected donations of school supplies this spring and summer. Pat filled new backpacks with supplies and grade-level-appropriate calculators and delivered them to children who are guests at GRIP in time for their first day of school.

SOS Shower Power: We continue to wait to be looped in to launder towels for this local nonprofit which has mobile shower trailers people who are houseless may use. We have "used" and "clean" bins set up for when our service is needed. We donated a huge pile of towels.

Jane and Mike Carnall recently celebrated their 40th wedding anniversary. We rejoice when Jane is able to take nature walks in Miller-Knox Park, and pray for more of those days.

From the Richmond Independent of February 25, 1916:

"The only way to save it was to drink it" said John Hanna of Stege in excusing himself for being intoxicated. He told such a good story that the judge let him off with a reprimand.

Here is his story:

"I was walking in from Albany when I came across a teamster who had lost a cask of wine from his wagon. The wagon being broken down, the teamster asked me to watch the wagon and cask while he went to Albany for another wagon. The barrel that had fallen from the wagon was leaking. In order to conserve the contents I secured a pitcher and

placed it beneath the leak. I found that I couldn't put it back in the barrel and saw no other way of disposing of it except to drink it."

"I had only one pitcher, and the wine flowed so rapidly from the leak that I had to fill the pitcher several times. I guess I drank all that leaked from the barrel."





Jens Hansen: Architect of Brickyard Cove & Richmond Yacht Club



I recently performed a historical evaluation for a 3-building science and tech laboratory complex on the shore of Berkeley's Aquatic Park. It was designed in 1971-73 by architect Jens Hansen, who, I was pleased to discover, had strong Point Richmond ties.

Jens Hansen's 2012 obituary states that he was a "longtime Bay Area architect," who earned his degree from U.C. Berkeley in 1949 and opened his own practice in Oakland in 1954. This practice was a partnership with Robert L. Goetz, known as Goetz & Hansen. It went on to become Goetz, Hansen & Johnson until 1964, when Robert Goetz left the firm and it was renamed Jens Hansen Associates AIA. Hansen's firm was based

in Oakland and he served on the Oakland Planning Commission, as member and chairman, in the early 1970s, until a conflict of interest with one of his own projects caused him to resign. In 1978, Hansen partnered with architects Michael Murakami and Takane Eshima forming the firm of Hansen/Murakami/Eshima (now Murakami/Nelson). He retired in 1998, but continued to be involved in architectural practice until his death in 2012.

According to Hansen's obituary, the Murakami/Nelson company website, newspaper articles, and other scholarship, Jens Hansen's portfolio included primarily office buildings and condominium complex projects throughout the East Bay. He also designed the campus of the California Col-

lege of Podiatric Medicine in San Francisco (ca.1974-75), renovated of a number of buildings on the U.C. Berkeley campus, and planned the Emeryville Marina (ca. 1976).

Hansen may have begun his familiarity with Point Richmond around 1965, when he designed the 20-unit apartment building at 420 Golden Gate Avenue. The paired tall narrow windows of the building echo those on the tech laboratory complex in Berkeley and seem to be a signature of Hansen's work. From Golden Gate Avenue, he went on to design the Richmond Yacht Club clubhouse, harbor, and small boat facility, completed in 1966, and then master-planned the Brickyard Cove development on the remaining yacht club acreage. In addition to conceiving of the unique waterfront neighborhood, he was commissioned for the custom design of a number of the houses there. Newspaper real estate sections feature at least three, with the most prominent being the home of yacht club founders, Bert and Muriel Claussen, at 1292 Sanderling Island. In newspapers it was described as a "modern Victorian," with balconies, alcoves, fireplaces, and ample windows. One of the first houses at Brickyard Cove, it was somewhat revolutionary for being two-stories and resting on a series of poles over the water, although most eventually would. Another illustrated mention was the Alvin Hamre Residence (1972), as well as Hansen's own house. which was described as being "like a glass bottom boat, [the] floors dotted with illuminated "portholes," so they can watch the fish swimming at night."

A Message from the Chief, taken from the Richmond Independent of March 1, 1913.

Skating in the Point Streets Must Stop Says the Chief

"Since the new asphalt paving has been installed on the West Side streets, children have been using the streets for a skating rink and a roadway for racing their bicycles."

"If the practice is not stopped we will have a terrible accident, says the Chief. If the parents will not cooperate with me, I will have to ask the Council to pass an ordinance which will keep them off the streets. Thursday evening a little girl broke her arm and a boy was narrowly missed by a machine. The escape from a fatal accident was miraculous and too close to be comfortable. It is too serious a matter to be treated lightly and I want the parents to cooperate with me."

Baltic Spice HouseNew Northern Indian Restaurant

The Baltic is back! The historic Baltic building at 135-137 Park Place will soon have a new restaurant on the ground floor: the Baltic Spice House, serving authentic Northern Indian cuisine. New owners Harjinder and Bhupinder Singh are in it for the long haul, having just signed a 20-year lease with landlord Daniel Butt. Hariinder is well known to the Point Richmond Community as the gracious owner of the Point Richmond Market and Deli at 160 Washington Avenue, which he has owned for over 10 years. He has provided some stability at that corner, site of the old Critchett Hotel, after multiple changes in ownership. He promises to bring the same stability to the Baltic Spice House. importantly, the new owners promise to bring back live music to the Baltic along with delicious food. There will be live music on Friday and Saturday nights, and they promise to restore the Tuesday night Blues Jam. They are currently working on getting a full liquor license from the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC), which can take up to 60 days. In

the meantime, while the liquor license is pending, they are hoping to have a soft opening for food only sometime in September.

Harjinder and Bhupinder have a deep respect for the historic look of the restaurant's interior. and have repainted the lower walls to match the previously dark wood-stained paneling. Contrary to popular belief, that paneling was not original – it dates to the 1950s when the two storefronts of the bar and the retail space next door were combined into one space. The upper walls and ceiling have been painted a warm goldenrod yellow, to brighten the dining room and to match the colors of the spices in Indian cuisine. The modern light fixtures will be replaced with chandeliers to create a more authentic look. The kitchen will have all new appliances, and there will be two chefs, each with extensive experience in the restaurant industry, one of whom, Deepak Bhardwaj, previously worked at an Indian Restaurant in Marin County.

The Baltic Building has an interesting history, replete with urban legends. The building was built in 1904, before Point Richmond's streets were paved and when the sidewalks were wooden

boardwalks. It was one of the first saloons in Point Richmond, originally called the Eagle's Nest. According to the historic plaque in the bar, the backbar and mirror were brought over from San Francisco prior to the 1906 Earthquake and Fire, and thus were saved from destruction. Over the years, the Baltic Building has served variously as a saloon, residence, funeral parlor, speakeasy, a house of ill repute, and several restaurants. One of the urban legends claims that there was once a tunnel that went from the basement of the Baltic. under Park Place and Washington Avenue, over to the Critchett Hotel, to provide an escape route for drunken bar patrons. However, an underground tunnel in that location would have been impossible, given that the nearby marshes would have kept the tunnel filled with water. Another urban legend states that the building once served as Richmond's City Hall, but that distinction belongs to the old Critchett Hotel (1905-1909) and the brick building at 210 Washington Avenue (1909-1915). The fact that the building once housed a funeral parlor may have given rise to yet another urban legend, the idea that the place was haunted.

In the first decade of the 20th Century, Point Richmond was a wild and woolly town, full of young men who worked at either Santa Fe Railway or the Standard Oil Refinery (now Chevron). The 1910 Census shows that the upper floors of the Baltic Building housed 25 men between the ages of 19 to 23. It would have been

like one big Spring Break party. At one point, there were 41 active saloons in town, so at closing time, the local constabulary would have had their hands full rounding up inebriated individuals to throw in the Drunk Tank in the back of the old brick Firehouse and Jail at 145 Park Place. The Womens Westside Improvement Club, formed in Point Richmond in 1908, also would have had their hands full trying to bring some civility to the town.

After decades of several restaurants of varying cuisines occupying the Baltic Building, soon the intoxicating aroma of Indian spices will be emanating from the kitchen of Baltic Spice House, a welcome addition to the Point Richmond restaurant scene.



Hotel D'Italia

In the first decade of the 1900's a surge of hotels established by Italian immigrants encompassed most of Standard Avenue. Of these hotels, not a single building survived demolition after the California Division of Highways invoked eminent domain to acquire property to realign Standard Avenue for the future Richmond-San Rafael Bridge. Both land with dwellings and vacant lots alike were seized for what would first become part of State Highway 17, then Interstate 580. One of these many hotels was the Hotel D'Italia at 200 Standard Avenue, established by Guido and Laura Pacini.

Guido Amerido Giovanni Pacini was born 10/26/1875 in Pistoia, Toscana near the Emilia-Romagna border. His wife, Laudemia "Laura" Baldacci Pacini was born 1/4/1876 in Lucca, Toscana. The couple immigrated to the U.S. from Tuscany along with their two sons, Erasmo "Jack" (10/26/1898-5/16/1982), and Vernardo

William "Bill" (5/4/1900-5/17/1995) about a month after Bill's birth. The family were settled in California when their third son, Carlo "Charlie" was born on 7/4/1903. The Pacini's resided in Point Richmond by the time their first daughter Annie was born November 24, 1904.


Like the Brignone family who owned the

Like the Brignone family who owned the Colombo, the Pacini's also opened their hotel in 1907. It was on the northwest corner of Standard and North Santa Fe Avenues. The D'Italia housed a bar and restaurant like most of the others. Many of the hotels were in close proximity to one another, but there were plenty of laborers in need of lodging. It would be a fair assessment to state that Standard Avenue was "Little Italy", not just of Point Richmond, but the entire city. That being said, there were many non-Italian laborers that found roofs over their heads on Standard Avenue too.

The Pacini family had an additional 4 children for a total of 8: Georgio "Joseph" (11/4/1906-5/21/1992), Alice Pacini Ragusa (2/8/1908-1/21/2004), Lena Pacini Maher (8/7/1912-12/7/2000), and Laura Pacini McJunkin (8/7/1917-5/6/1971). In 1914, after less than a decade in business, the Pacini family relocated to central Contra Costa County. Guido found work as a drayman, and many of the Pacini siblings would start families and spend the rest of their lives in the Bay Point/Pittsburg/Port Chicago area.

Although the family had moved and Guido was now delivering goods, they kept the hotel while others managed it.

The first new managers for the Pacini's hotel were Ricardo Molinari and his wife, Gertrude Ricardo was 9/13/1870 in Ancona, Marche, and immigrated in 1902 and settled in San Francisco. Gertrude "Tula" Arenales Botti Molinari was born 10/25/1880 in Guatemala. immigrated to the U.S. in 1891 and settled in San Francisco as well. She and her first husband, Silvio Dotti, were opera singers at the Tivoli Grand Opera House in San Francisco, which perished



flames during the 1906 earthquake. Her 1901 marriage to Dotti was short lived.

Ricardo and Tula married around 1906 and had three children, George (1907-1998), Emma Molinari Alviso (1910-2002), and Elsie Molinari Pucci (1912-2007). Ricardo had a background managing restaurants and hotels in the San Francisco area, qualities suited for D'Italia. The family moved to Point Richmond, and Ricardo primarily managed the bar and restaurant while Tula ran the hotel. After a few years they returned to San Francisco to manage the Hotel Gorizia in 1917. The couple would manage several restaurants and hotels until their retirement. They last resided in South San Francisco where Ricardo died 7/17/1944 at age 73. Tula died 6/3/1967 at age 86.

Yugoslavian immigrant Charles Senjo, (born 4/24/1886) was the next manager of the D'italia. He immigrated in 1904 and had operated hotels and restaurants in the Oakland area prior to moving to the D'Italia. He ran it for about 5 years before returning to Alameda County around 1922, where he resumed managing hotels and restaurants. After marrying his wife Gussie (1891-1988), he returned to Point Richmond in the late twenties where he was a general laborer for a time. He and Gussie would ultimately settle in San Leandro and had a son, Robert. In his later years, Charles retired from managing hotels and restaurants, to become a liquor dealer. While a spectator at a professional boxing match in San Francisco, he died of a heart attack on 12/12/1951 at age 65. Their son, Robert, died on his 71st birthday in 2003.

After Charles Senjo's departure, the building was demolished, leaving only the foundation intact.

The Pacini's retained ownership of the land, which was vacant from thereon. In the 1930's Guido and Laura left Contra Costa County for Oakland, residing there for many years before moving to Santa Cruz in 1940. Guido died 9/14/1948 at age 72 while in Pittsburg. At the time of his death the family still owned the parcel of land at 200 Standard Avenue that had been a vacant lot for more than a quarter century. Less than two years later, the State of California came calling for the piece of real estate referred to as parcel 8671 of Osborn's Addition on the assessor's map.

Unlike the Colombo and other hotels on Standard Avenue, D'Italia wasn't around long enough to be affected by eminent domain. livelihood was lost, and no people were displaced from their homes. When negotiations were finished between Jack Pacini and the California Division of Highways in 1950, the Pacini family settled for \$965.10 for the 3,217 square foot parcel, equivalent to \$9,919.00 today. Though somewhat small, a piece of commercial real estate for less than \$10,000 cannot be had today. This rampant example of inequity is what would-be homeowners and small businesses must face today. One may solely cite inflation, but the coinage of 1950 was 90% silver, while today's coins have the intrinsic value of gaming tokens.

Laudemia "Laura" Pacini died in Santa Cruz 5/9/1958 at age 82, and Annie Pacini Mellor died in 1991 at age 86. The Pacini's first American born child, Charlie died 2/18/1982 at age 78. His wife, Aline, outlived her husband and both of their sons. She died in 2015 at age 103. The D'Italia existed less than 20 years, but is another piece of the Point's

past. As I read names from the State right of way files preserved by the Hibma's, I see plenty more stories of Standard Avenue to be told. When I pull my old directories off my bookcases, I see the same names. Little Italy is long gone, but not forgotten.



Bay Trail Tails and Neighborly Dogs

Fifteen or so years ago flying United Airlines from San Francisco to Denver my wife got into a conversation with a young man, an entrepreneur, a venture capitalist. He explained how his little endless packet of serrated green plastic bags would revolutionize picking up dog poop. Toilet paper and paper towels were handy, but bags facilitated touchless picking up and disposing. He gave us the business card of his Hayward enterprise. My 50-year accumulation of business cards housed in repurposed Dom Perignon champagne boxes had a Pets category. Veterinarians cared for our two Maltese, Isis and Tasha, and two cats, Mindon and Ketzela. We have been petless for over a decade and enjoy other people's dogs. We have nostalgic pet photographs and a red pencil from our Omaha groomer Mark at The Dog House. The business file included the poop bag entrepreneur's business card.





We are a dog friendly, orderly and sanitary society. Trails and sidewalks have signs for sharing the path, leashing rules and supplies for cleaning up. Dog parks are standard urban amenities and provide socialization and exercise for humans and beasts. In May 2020 a leash law breakdown in New York's Central Park went viral as a woman exercised white entitlement against a black birdwatcher.

The 307-acre Miller/Knox Regional Shoreline Park in Richmond dedicated in 1972 honors two liberal Democrats. State Senator George Miller, Jr., (1914-1969) and John T. Knox, (1924-2017), a Point Richmond resident and State

Assemblyman for West Contra Costa County, 1960-80, instrumental in the 1965 San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission and the 1970 California Environmental Quality Act.

Sylvia Schild an animal advocate responding to the banning of off leash activity created PIDO, Point Isabel Dog Owners, in 1985 as a nonprofit corporation advocating an off leash recreation area. Off leash privileges were restored in 1987 when the U.S. Postal Service leased 23-acres at Richmond's southern end, to the East Bay Regional Parks, Point Isabel Dog Park.

Sixty-seven per cent of American households are pet owners. Eighty-five million

households own a dog, cat, bird, fish or horse. If statistics are to be believed Wyoming has the highest percentage of households with a dog, 72%, Rhode Island the lowest at 45%. As a region, New England, Maine, Vermont, New Hampshire and Connecticut have more cats than dogs. Forty per cent of California households have dogs. In mv sixteen household neighborhood centered on a courtyard, 5 homes have seven dogs, Skyler, Savannah, Mickey, King, Sullie, Ace and Gabriel, the last two being pandemic additions. Muggins died of old age. My neighborhood with 37.5 percent of dog ownership is typical California.

Pets are vital to human wellbeing. In honor of National Pet Day, instituted in 2005, the New York Times Book Review on April 11, 2021 featured photographs of prominent writers, five women and two men, with their pets, four dogs, two cats and George Orwell's goat Muriel, not quite Animal Farm.

On the Bay Trail we saw a dog jump four feet vertically. The owner said he was a mix of Australian sheep dog and a Catahoula Leopard dog named after Catahoula Parish, Louisiana. I called Point Richmond's Catahoula Coffee Co., the owner had owned two Catahoula dogs.

Memories of Santa Fe's Indian Village and My Family

Thinking about the ordeals of American Indians makes me want to cry like a little boy in the wilderness of the world's poverty. I know what poverty is, I have been there. I grew up as an FDR Kid amidst World War Two, in a little white house on 4th Street in Richmond, CA, a city that built 747 victory ships in its Kaiser Shipyards between 1942 and 1945. I remember that I would tell all the kids at school that I was born in the White House but corrected that I was born in a white house. I had an older brother who fought in Italy and was awarded the Purple Heart. I also had a brother who fought in the Philippine Islands, they both came back alive.

A lot of my school friends were Indians whose fathers worked for the Santa Fe Railroad and lived on the Santa Fe's Indian Village. Their company supplied housing was pitiful and tiny, described by some as hovels. When I was five years old, during the war years I would attend their pow wows. My dad was Valentine Ramirez who worked for Santa Fe for 48 years and was told to retire at the age of 72. While working for the Santa Fe Railroad, he had many Indian worker friends. I knew many of these Indian kids as well. My dad knew how to live off the land as he planted crops of Indian corn and tomatoes and traded eggs, vegetables and walnuts for bay caught bass. At one time, he had as many as 30 hens and had barrels so he could make his own wine.



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
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
