It isn't too early to mark your calendar on Sunday, December 9th, 5 P. M. for the Messiah, the historic Methodist Church's gift to the community.



Parishioner, Margo Patterson Santos recently hosted an art show at Contra Costa College. Margo showed her original works of art.


Walking at George Miller Park can be a real treat. The Pt. Richmond walkers have been keeping their eyes on a group of pelicans in the lagoon.

Point Methodist Church History

One church group in the 1920's was the SOCIAL LEAGUE of the first Methodist Episcopal Church whose history is reflected in their minutes printed below and taken from the canvas covered, red leather cornered notebook which cost \$1.15. The minutes are printed as written. This is the 52nd installment.

Aug 16, 1926

Social League met at the home of Mrs. Owens. Mrs. Alexander assisted her as hostess. There were eighteen members present and three visitors.

Bills at Alberts, florists, and 87¢ to Mrs. Jones voted paid. Discussion regarding the continuance of the calender month followed.

The League is in favor of continuing in the same manner as before, and making no changes.

In the 1939 RUHS sports was Andy Cakos, local great baseball player, his position was that of catcher. No runner tried to knock him over a the plate: Andy weighed over 200 pounds. Richard "Chub" Ervin also played ball as a good second baseman. In this 1939 class, on the swimming team, were LeRoy Williams, Sparky Allyn and Herb Collins. Berbie was a platform diver and Bert Childs of Point Richmond was the tennis coach for that year. The girls baseball manager was Point Richmond's Charlotte Doney and Ellen Cunan, also from the Point was a member of the Girls Athletic Association.

The 2001 baseball season is over and we anticipate a great World Series between the New York Yankees and the Arizona Diamondbacks. What do you think of the way some Big League players wear their uniforms? The pant legs are dropped and grading on the ground and look terrible and as bad as the way some of the present high school boys wear their pants. Speaking of slack and pants worn by the high school kids, you should have seen the pats (cords) we used to wear! We bought them and were not washed until they could stand up by themselves. During the rainy season you can realize what occurred. Our mothers could not under stand why we would not let them be washed. Check out LeRoy

(George) Williams picture in the 1939 Shield, he was wearing one of our coveted cords which had a brilliant shine to them. (Note: *The Shield* was the annual year book for the Richmond Union School).

The 1932 Richmond High baseball team was a successful one with Steve 'Legs' LeGault pitching; Les Scarsella, first base; and Brooks Holder, outfielder. They all became professional baseball players.

Point Richmond native and present resident, Jim Hurley, was the number one tennis player for the 1932 RUHS tennis team. Point native Phil Carlin was also a member of that team. Carlins' people had a store next to the old bank building (Sherry and Bob's) on Washington and West Richmond Avenues.

Steve LeGault was a good baseball pitcher. His father 'Pop' LeGault was a great friend of Richmond's youth and semi-pro baseball teams. He was always seen at Seawright Field (Nichol Park Baseball Field) at ball games smoking his traditional cigars. I played on his sponsored teams, "The LeGault Builders". Pop LeGault was the contractor for the building of Our Lady of Mercy Catholic Church Rectory or parish house. A great man who was loved by all.

Local Newspaper Clippings, Richmond - 1913 - 1932

GRADY BOUNCED FROM COURT BY JUDGE FOR HIS LOUD TALKING

October 7, 1914

Threatens to Dissolve Partnership with Attorney Robenson if Case is Continued, But so Far All's Well.

International controversies were threatened today in the trial of Mike Rakovitch charged with having conducted a

"blind pig" when Police Judge Lindsey arose and ordered Attorney D.W. Grady to leave the courtroom. When that legal celebrity failed at once to comply with the magistrate's command, Chief of Police Walker was ordered to arrest him.

The argument which caused Grady's expulsion arose when City Attorney Hall appealed to the judge that Grady was using unnecessary language in his cross examination of Officer Elgerman, one of the witnesses, to which Grady replied that he needed no assistance, from outsiders.

As he was being pulled away from the counsel table he threatened a dissolution of partnership with Attorney Robenson, the junior member of the firm if he carried on the case.

When Grady had finally been ushered through the doors of the courtroom Judge Lindsey called upon Robenson to continue the case.

"I'm afraid that I am in a peculiar circumstance for the reason that if I let the case go it will be dismissed and if I carry it on I will no longer be a member of the firm.," said Robenson.

"Whaddymean?" You'll be dropped from the firm?" asked the judge. "Either continue the case or I'll drop it."

And with that Robinson took up the cross examination reins where his senior partner had dropped off.

WILEY APPOINTED DRIVER OF NEW PATROL WAGON

November 24, 1914

After considerable dispute last evening the Council adopted the recommendation of Chief of Police Charles Walker that Oliver Wiley be appointed to the position of driver of the new patrol wagon which is expected to arrive in Richmond about the first of December. The appointment will take effect upon the arrival of the motor wagon from the east and the salary for the position was fixed at \$99.00 per month.

The only opposition to the appointment was made by Councilman Ludewig who claimed that he did not want to see the council take "snap judgment" upon the proposition. He contended that the car has not yet arrived and that there, were numerous other applications for the position. His chief grievance seemed to be that as a member of the police commission he had been ignored in the matter, and felt that it should have been discussed with him.

Chief Walker, stated that the slight was not intentional as he had talked with other members of the commission with reference to the Appoint of Wiley. And they seemed to be satisfied with the suggestion. He said that he had make an effort to see Ludewig, but had been unable to find him.

When a vote was taken all of the members voted to adopt the recommendation of the chief of police with the single exception of Councilman Ludewig.

CAPTIAN DRUGER MAKES EXTRAORDINARY FIND

March 18, 1914

Digs a mess of Clams on Mud Flats Near the Cutting Canal for His Supper and Discovers Gem Pronounced by San Francisco Experts fo be Worth Thousands of Dollars - Is Perfect in Shape and Color and as Big as a Large Marble - Will Be Sent to New York for Appraisement.

One of the most extraordinary finds in the way of gems was made in the neighborhood of the Cutting canal Monday evening by Captain William Kruger, of the dredge Richmond. Captain Druger has a penchant for stewed clams and Monday he collected a bucketful of the succulent bivalves and took them aboard the dredge to prepare them for his supper. He steamed the clams just sufficient to open them and when taking out the meat came across a large round pearl as big as a large marble such as the school boys of Richmond use for taws. The pearl was of a fine luster and perfect in shape. Captain Druger yesterday morning took his find to San Francisco and gave it into the keeping of H.W. Werse, who in turn submitted it to an expert, who pronounced the gem one of the most beautiful and perfect that had came under his observation for years.

The gem is of a pink color, so much prized by connoisseurs in precious stones, and has all the characteristics of a perfect gem.

It was decided by Captain Kruger yesterday, on the advice of the expert, to send the pearl to Tiffany of New York, the world's recognized experts, to submit the gem to a special treatment that will bring out and intensify its beauty. After undergoing this process the pearl will be appraised. The expert pronounced the gem to be worth from \$10.000 to \$100,000 dependent on its color after treatment.

The pearl, yesterday afternoon, was shown to a representative of this paper, and although that individual is not up on the subject of precious stones, it has all the appearances of being a beauty.

The clam from which the pearl was secured was dug near where the big dredge is at work on Cutting canal in the mud flats and it is quite possible that there are many others as large and valuable as the one Mr. Kruger found domiciled in the interior of other clams around Richmond.

In its purity, liquid beauty, and charm of romantic and poetical association the pearl, aristocrat of gem, leads over the peers of the highest rank, the diamond, emerald, ruby and sapphire. The sea gem has throughout all recorded time formed the fitting necklace of feminine royalty and famous beauty; the dusky Oriental potentates, and their principal treasurers

have been pearls.

In the technical literature of the United States national museum, the pearl is coldly and remorselessly comprehended under the generic term "carbonate of lime" along with the beautiful and less valued coral, which is also a product of the sea: and marble which concerns architects and sculptors, more than gem fanciers; and calcite and aragonite wich are varieties of Satan spar and far down in the gem scale in hardness.

The beauty and value of pearls in grief, depend upon color, texture, or "skin" transparency of "water" luster, and form; pearls most desired are round or pear shamed, without blemish and having the hisgest degree of luster.

While individual pearls or strands of them may be worth a prince's ransom, their beauty and value are not immutable; pearls may deteriorate with age or be sullied by the action of gases, vapors or acids.

Pearls are found in nearly all bivalves with nacreous shell, that is, oysters, clams, etc.

It is expected that much interest will be aroused in Richmond over the finding of the pearl by Captain Kruger and it may be possible that others will attempt to find some of the beautiful gems of the sea on the mud flats along the waterfront.

Our Lady of Mercy Catholic Church will be having its Centennial Year in 2002. Parishioners, Nancy and Stan Toledo are in charge. They are looking for any information about our church that they can use. Parishioners Fred Siegmund and Stan Toledo came us with pictures of all of the former Pastors of our church. This created a lot of research because Our Lady of Mercy Church was closed during the Depression years and all records were lost. There is a Patricia McKinley Foundation in Richmond that offers scholarships. Every year there is a fund raiser in the form of a crab feed. Brenda, Patricia's mother, is involved. At one fund raiser, I won a three foot hand-painted picture of a Buffalo Soldier. You will have to investigate a Buffalo Soldier as I did. I gave it to Brenda McKinley to donate to Washington School in memory of here daughter Patricia. Is it still there?

I used to love his 10 cent hamburgers and 15 cent milk shakes. His place is now known as the Great American Hamburger. You should have seen the business transacted their on the day of the "Save the Plunge" fund raiser. That reminded me of the days the "Bath House" had big swimming events and other activities. Ardell Ciabattari used to make 300 dollars a day during the depression years at his Kozy-Koffee Counter.

Two of Point Richmond Native Sons passed away recently. Al Franco and Theodore Beck. We grew up with them and knew them well. Al Franco was very well liked and was a great friend of the late Robert Dornan. They were seen together frequently one very tall and the other considerably shorter. Ted Beck grew up on our side of the tracks (East Richmond) and used the Point tennis courts very much as he was a very good player. His dad was captain on the San Rafael Ferry boats.

Will the next Mayor or Richmond come from Point Richmond or will the Mayor become the third woman to serve our city as Mayor? I wonder what former Mayor, Jim Kenny, has to say about the recent turmoil that is existing in this coming November election for mayor. Jim Kenny was raised in the Point

and served as Mayor of Richmond. Kenny was involved in a very interesting campaign himself. We missed Jim at our recent Catholic Church Steak BBQ.

I have a question for our favorite and talented Point Librarian concerning the famous author, Rudyard Kipling. I have a book titled "Life's Handicap" by Kipling. On the front page is a circle with the "swastika" in the center, and his autograph, copyrite 1891. What does it mean?

Joannie and Rod Phillips are members of Our Lady of Mercy Church and are very musically talented. Joannie sings and Rod plays the organ and bag pipes. You may have heard them perform. Rod Phillips is related by marriage to Katherine Lee Bates. She wrote the famous "America the Beautiful" which is played very often these days. Joannie and Rod own the S/V Nehemiah

which is docked by the Salute Restaurant in Marina Bay here in Richmond. The S/V Nehemiah is a 57 foot wooden ketch which has been twice around the world. It is U.S. Coast Guard certified to 34 passengers and is available for charter. Rod Phillips is a licensed Captain and works on Ferry Boats on San Francisco Bay. I have a free two hour sail for 34 people which was donated by the Phillips' during a recent Our Lady of Mercy BBQ Raffle. If interested, please let me know?

The mystery photo published in a recent "This Point.....in time" is of Jim Forbes and Allan Smith, both native sons of Point Richmond. It was taken at the World's Fair on Treasure Island in 1939. From the looks on their faces it appears that they just attended the No. 1 most popular exhibit at the sSan Francisco World's Fair. It was "Sally Rand's NUDE Ranch".

Important History Grant to Richmond

The Richmond Public Library, the Richmond Musuem of History, and the JFK University Department of Museum Studies, working as partners, have been awarded a National Leadership Grant for Museum Library Collaboration form the federal Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). The grant award of \$199,325 will be used during a two year period to support the WWII Richmond, California, Home Front Digital Project.

The project will bring together text and images from local collections into a single website. The digital collection will be available to the public via the internet. In addition, access will be provided through public PCs located in the library and the museum, and in the planned visitor center of the new Rosie the Riveter/World War II Home Front National Historic Park.

Lois Boyle, the president of the Richmond Museum of History said, "The Richmond Museum of History has collected Richmond history since 1954 to preserve the legacy of those who lived, worked, and participated in the development of Richmond. Making our artifacts available to a world wide audience through virtual exhibits on the internet is very exciting. We are pleased that our collection relating to the role that Richmond played during World War II will be highlighted through the grant".
