

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

An update on the Association: It's in good financial condition. We have no outstanding debts but membership is down slightly. So, please remember to renew and get new friends to join. As there are many Point residents who are not members, you are the backbone of the association.

An update on Indian Statue Park: The irrigation and electrical work is completed. The city has informed the Park committee that due to the water shortage there has been a delay on the landscaping but it will be done soon. Bricks that were made by volunteers on May 21 and 22 and fired by Port Costa Brick, are to be put in place in the park in June. Orders will be taken until July 4th and these, too, will be put down soon after they are fired. The park will be completed by September and ready for the INDIAN STATUE DAY in October.

The Association has received three items fromBob Bray at Brickyard Landing. One is a large accounts payable and receivable ledger covering April 1907 to August 1915. Looking over some of the entries, I found that in 1907, the Palace Hotel Co. bought almost \$18,000 in materials. I assume they were rebuilding after the quake. The other two donations are a stock certificate book for Richmond Pressed Brick Company dated 1908, and a United Materials Co. book dated 1920. Our thanks to Bob. If anyone has historical items in the basement or attic, we welcome your donations.

We are still looking into the possibility of moving the small "Hazel Carr Building" to use as a museum.

Our picnic and "weenie roast" in Miller-Knox brought out a small but enthusiastic gaggle of "Pointers" - from (\u00fc timers to new comers. (Surely hated missing it but hope to see you all at our September meeting!) Thanks to the Society faithful who were there to welcome members, guests and visitors. (Several of these joined our Society on the spot!)

DREDGE COMPANY ASKS ADVANCE

"When the American Dredging company asked for an advance of \$800 on the \$10,000 payment soon due on their job of dredging the turning basin the city council last night was divided on the request but finally referred it to City Attorney D. J. Hall and City Engineer H. D. Chapman. . ."

May 7, 1918

MISS NYSTROM CAUGHT SPEEDING

"When Miss Hazel Nystrom, popular stenographer and bookkeeper of the Home Laundry company, did not show up at her work yesterday morning, Manager Jack Best. . .instituted a search. . .and found that she had been undergoing an experience in the Oakland police court.

Miss Nystrom, who takes pride in her ability to handle the big Nystrom automobile, was caught Sunday night while exceeding the speed limit on Twelfth street and Twenty-fourth avenue. The judge fined her \$10, but seeing it was her first appearance before him remitted the fine."

May 7. 1918

RED CROSS WOMEN WILL PARADE

"Complete details . . . of the big parade of women Red Cross members were given

out this morning by Mrs. J. C. Owens . . . grand marshal . . . the parade will include fifteen units.

A public demonstration will be held at the Point theatre at 5:45 o'clock. It will be participated in by the Standard Oil band and Red Cross members. Extra street cars will be waiting to bring all to Second and Macdonald avenue in time to participate in the parade. . ."

May 17, 1918

MASQUERADE PARTY AT KOZY KOVE

"On next Wednesday evening a masquerade party will be staged at the Kozy Kove dancing pavilion, to which the young people of the city will be made welcome. There will be three prizes, two of which will be for the best sustained characters and the third as a 'booby' prize. . ."

May 17, 1918

60 YEARS AGO...

PARADE FOR NEW FERRY SERVICE

"... In recognition of new and better and faster ferry service, the Richmond Chamber of Commerce, City Council and service clubs are sponsoring a big motor parade, a trip across the bay, and a motor caravan up Market street spreading the word 'travel via Richmond—the scenic route'.

Three ferryboats, ... on a 30 minute schedule, will be in service at 6 a.m. to-morrow. .. Southern Pacific begins ... bus service from 10th and Macdonald, connecting will all ferry boats. .. including the late ferry leaving San Francisco at 12:30 a.m. Heretofore, Richmond passengers on the last boat, if they did not have their own motor car, were forced to walk the three miles to downtown Richmond. .."

May 4, 1928

FUN NIGHT AT POINT THEATRE

"Tommy's Fun and Gifts Night', a new feature at the Point theatre on Sunday evenings will prevail as usual tomorrow night with emphasis on fun and frivolity.

A \$15 floor lamp will be given away free of charge during the course of the evening in addition to 150 other prizes which will be distributed . . . during Tommy's part of the show.

It costs no more for the chance of winning a prize than the regular admission . . . "

May 3,3,1928

FIRE ENGINE FOLLOWERS FINED

"Following a fire engine isn't the fun it used to be, particularly when it is in direct violation of a city ordinance.

Seven persons who broke the ordinance last Saturday by following a fire engine to a small roof fire, were haled into court today and charged also with parking within one block of the blaze. Each was fined \$2 by Police Judge C. A. Odell."

50 YEARS AGO ...

1700 LETTERS FLOWN FROM HERE

"More than 1700 special air mail letters bearing the Richmond cachet, were included in the pouch flown from here yesterday to Oakland airport . . .

The special air mail cargo, which weighed more than 30 pounds, was flown from the

landing field on the inner harbor by William Finnegan, who was sworn in as a special air mail pilot for the day.

Finnegan was accompanied . . . by Dennis Shaw, assistant postmaster here, who personally delivered the mail pouch to the mail station at Oakland airport.

About 150 gathered near the Ford plant to witness the first mail flight directly from Richmond."

May 20, 1938

"A pleasant afternoon was enjoyed by members of Washington P.-T.A. and their guests at a dessert-whist party yesterday.

Hostesses (were) Mrs. Don V. Hill, Mrs. Alex McCook and Mrs. A. A. Palenchar.

Those who won prizes were Mesdames Herbert Bill, LeRoy Alexander, Stephen Banks, Theodore Hultberg, Walter Paasch and A. Fowler..."

May 24, 1938

DRUIDS HEAR PICNIC REPORT

"Reports of the annual picnic of the Point Richmond Grove and Circle of Druids . . . were given at a meeting last night.

Mrs. Angelina Cizmich presided and refreshments were seved by Mrs. Marie Ceridono and Charles Ceridono..."

May 24, 1938

NO INDEPENDENT MONDAY

"Due to the Memorial Day holiday and the work of moving the Independent to its new quarters at Tenth and Bissell, there will by no issue of this newspaper on Monday. (was at 1079 Macdonald avenue)

The meeting, to be held in the school auditorium at 1:30 p.m. will include selections by the following: Giee Club (5th and 6th graders), Mrs. Ancell; Tonette Band (3rd and 4th grades), Miss Ariani; orchestra(upper grades), Miss Ariani; primary grades, Mrs. Dudley and Mrs. Bockman.

Prizes will be awarded to the mother rearing the largest family; the mother who has the most children attending Washington School, and the newest mother."

May 12, 1948

YOUTHS HELD AFTER BEER DRINGING...

"Five hoys ranging from 16 to 19 years were taken into custody at 1:15 Sunday morning when police found them in a car parked at Standard and Santa Fe Avenues. All were charged with bein intoxicated.

The officers found one can of beer in the car and report that one of the youths told him the group drank 18 cans, most of it while they had been parked at Point Molate."

May 17, 1948

POINT METHODIST WSCS

" SCS of Point Richmond Methodist Church enjoyed a social meeting last week, arranged by Mrs. Robert Peterson.

Plans were made for a rummage sale on June II and 12. Discussed was the recent successful tea.

A pot-luck dinner is planned for Friday, May 28. To be in the Friendship Hall of the church, everyone is invited to attend. The next regular meeting date is June 4."

May 26, 1948

MR.,MRS. BROWN NOW RESIDENTS OF POINT RICHMOND . . .

"Last week Mr. and Mrs. William & Q. Brown joined the Point Richmond colony, moving from perkeley to 27 Water Street. Mr. Brown, a native of this city and graduate of local schools, formerly lived in Water street with his parents, the senior William Browns, early residents of Richmond.

He and the former Miss Jo Clayre Gormley were married a few months ago in Reno and until now have lived in Berkeley. She attended schools in Havre, Montana, later majoring in journalism and music at College of

Puget Sound, Tacoma.

Both young people are on the editorial staff of an Oakland newspaper. Mr. Brown being photo editor. Formerly with the editorial staff of the Independent, he served as first mate in the Merchant Marine during the war."

May 1, 1958

POLICE PROBE POISON DEATH MYSTERY HERE...

"The death of a Richmond housewife who apparently drank ant poison in the mistaken belief that it was harmless cough syrup, is under investigation by police today. The coroner's office has also scheduled an autopsy report.

Mrs. Vera Werner, 42, of ll7 Park Place, died at 4:15 a.m. Sunday at Brookside Hospital, 15 hours after she had been rushed to the hospital. She called a phone company operator to report her illness and the operator summoned an ambulance.

Mrs. Werner's husband, Calvin, was in Berkeley Saturday and learned of the poisoning when he called from there to inform her he had been delayed and would be late returning home.

On the instruction of the hospital physicians Werner obtained from his home for their examination a 3-ounce bottle of ant poison which he found nearly empty.

Werner discounted possibility of suicide, relating the adoption of their foster son Dennis two weeks ago, and their plans for the home at the Park Place address they were buying.

The boy was being cared for by friends for the weekend and was not home when the accident occurred.

Mrs. Werner had been an employe of an Emeryville tire and rubber plant. She was a native of Missouri.

Funeral arrangements are pending at the Wilson and Kratzer mortuaries. "

"The betrothal of Irene Aikens to Ron Dibble is being announced by her parents, the Rev. and Mrs. Ira Aikens of 322 Washington Ave.

The couple will be married on Sunday, June 29, in the Point Richmond Baptist church, where Irene's father is minister.

The bride-elect was graduated from Downey High school in Modesto and is president of Phi Alpha Epislon Chapter, Beta Sigma Phi. She is employed by Shell Development company.

Ron attended Berkeley High school, West Contra Costa junior college and not is a student at Oregon State college. He is a former junior college president and currently is resident advisor at the men's dorm at OSC. He served with the U.S. Army in Korea and his parents are Mr. and Mrs. Clark L. Dibble of Berkeley.

May 6, 1958

FIRE STATION PLANS AT PT. UNDER STUDY . . .

"Designation of an architect to draw plans for a new fire station in Point Richmond will be considered by the City Council Monday.

City Manager Edwin S. Howell said that next year's budget will include funds for planning only and nothing for construction.

He said he is studying a lease-purchase agreement calling for the land and property to return to the city after a certain number of years of leasing the structure.

Also up for consideration is a plan to have the station built on city-owned property as a combination fire house-library-storage warehouse. Howell said old city records could be stored on the ground floor of the new building, with the fire station and a library sharing upstairs quarters.

Howell said that Point Richmond could be served by the fire staion at S. 12th St. and Cutting Blvd. while the new fire house was under construction."

IN PURSUIT OF HISTORICAL TRIVIA

ANSWER:

The historical trivia question for last month asked about the purpose of the official visit to the city of Richmond in 1916 by Rear Admiral Charles F. Pond, USN (and quite possibly Franklin D. Ro . welt, then Undersecretary of the Navy). Admiral Pond was detailed by the Navy Department to select the most suitable of sites offered for a proposed Naval Academy on the West Coast. His report seemed to favor the Richmond site over those located in San Diego and the Paget Sound. On the inside covers of this issue are two engineer's illustrations, a bird'seve view and a map. They are from an ambitious brochure prepared to convince the Navy Department and Congress. (A copy is on display in a Richmond Museum exhibit.)

The bird's-eye view is over Point Potrero (therein referred to as Point Nicholl), where Shipyard 3 was later located and where Pasha Industries now unload and store automobiles from Japan.

The map shows the academy site and also a naval base site that extends from Brooks Island to the opposite side of Albany Hill, including Point Isabel (near present mail distribution center) and Point Fleming (where Golden Gate Fields now sits). What an environmental impact report the project would entail and produce in this day and age!

The entry of the United States into World War I caused the West Coast Academy proposal to be dropped; and early Richmond's dream of being the Annapolis of the Pacific Coast ended.

CAMP FIRE MEMORIES

Maude Wood was a Camp Fire Girls leader in the Point, 1932-33. A scrapbook of their activities, "Diary of the Pikida Wakan Camp Fire Group", was kept by Pikida, Kokokoho, Wakoda, Wapo Moma and Tanda, Indian names of the girls chosen by themselves. This is the 15th installment of excerpts from the diary.

Trip to Vallejo November 24-26, 1933

Friday, the 24th, the Pikida Wakan group took a trip to Valbjo. After packing the suitcases on the back of the car we started for Vallejo. We were met on the other side of the bridge by Frances Wilkenson who was to show us the way to their clubhouse. After handing us each a stick of gum and getting Betty Wms in her car we enjoyed a ride through and around Vallejo lead by Frances in a dizzy way to the CF. house. There we were met by the rest of the girls. We changed our clothes and went to the dance. Before the dance was over, Mi ss Wood, Betty Williams, Frances Wilkenson and Betty Doman went home ahead of the rest and got some when they came. Betty Dornan gave a very enlightening speech bestowing a set of lemonade glasses and spoons to the Ocepiapi group for their housewarming. It was appropriately answered by Lois Kaiser in surprise.

We got to sleep about 4: 00 AM that

night. Everyone slept good with exceptions.

Saturday morn we rose bright and early with the thought of riding a nice horse in our mind. After bouncing all over the horse and having a few slight changes we started off (on a horse) what a time, bump-bump-bump- was it fun.

POINT BAPTIST CHURCH

We missed the last issue of TPIT, but want you to know we are still here and conducting services thrice weekly-Sunday morning at 11:00, Sunday evening at 7:00 and Wednesday evening at 7:30. Like our neighbor churches, we are well into our eighth decade at the same location here in the Point. There are two interesting displays of early Point pictures in town, one in the windows of the Rec Center and one in the hallway between the florist and drug store. Fascinating photographs-notice the shots of the Abbott Hospital and Hotel Mac-other buildings from the first decade of this century. How sturdy those old buildings seem. solid and permanent as if they would be right there for the next eighty years. I think buildings from that era were made out of better stuff. (I know the people were!)

Our neighbor state to the north has lured quite a few of our finest folk lately. Donna & Rosey Roselius first and more recently Don and Judy Spilman who have establish ed their own business in Myrtle Point, Oregon. The Spilmans seem off to a good start, their new adventure is called "Back to Basics" and features such far-ranging services as a deli with soup and sandwiches to antiques along with crafts. Don was busy restoring old homes in this area and he and Judy have long been in the antique business. "Back to Basics" also sells homemade fudge. Size of books to be 5½ x 8 inches the party of the first part to sell advertisements to be printed on the opposite page, covers and other conspicuous places. Among those giving us money for ads were (anyone remember?)

Abbott Hospital, The Hub, The Popular Store, Dr. Harold I. Horner, Truitt & Mac Quiddy, Philpott Dry Goods, The Kozy, Subway Furniture Co., Richmond Supply Company (still here? Is that Trannie's store?), White Sewing Machine, Garrison

Brothers, - the list goes on.

Unfortunately, a copy of this church directory cannot be found.

We often meet people who say they came to church here and to Vacation Bible School many years ago as children. And, once a few years ago a lovely lady joined us on a Sunday morning. She was Mrs. Dorothy Lipp who grew up in the Point and later moved to Sacramento. Mrs. Lipp stood in the entranceway and looked up toward the baptistry and said, "I was baptised right up there nearly seventy years ago and it scared me so much I haven't been back." But she stayed with us for morning service and said the old building had changed very little. We were glad to hear that-that's the way we want it.

Enjoy a fabulous summer with Point Richmond as home base...if you can't find what you're looking for here, it does not exist.


"Winter", Len Deighton's latest novel does not refer to a season of the year. It is the story of two brothers Peter and Paul Winter, both born near the turn of the century whose adult lives evolve during Hitler's reign. One brother maintains the standards of the old Germany while the other becomes enmeshed in the Nazi Orbit.

Another era, another war provides the basis for "Shrapnel in the Heart" by Laura Palmer. It is a collection of letters left at the Vietnam Memorial in Washington D.C. Not only are the letters or parts of them reproduced, but follow up comments are made by Ms. Palmer gathered when she traced the letters to the writers.

A fascinating person was Oscar Wilde. In the biography of the same name, Richard Ellmann brings to a conclusion his work of some 20 years duration. He captures not only Wilde's charm and high spirits but also the darker side of his personality.


My wife and I thought you might be interested in the following article for one of your issues of "This Point ...in time".
