
It will soon be May and time for the Kid's Reunion. To those who have attended before, you know the fun...but maybe not the work it takes to make this event successful.

The poinsettia plant is popular at Christmastime; does that mean the Eggplant will be popular at Easter?


Congratulations to the Richmond Museum of History on its 45th anniversary

Joke: Friends had arrived and after greeting them the host told them, "You know, after your recommending that author I went out and bought his other book."



1 package of dry onion soup
1 chicken – about 4 pounds
1 can (3 oz) of mushrooms
1 10 oz. Can chicken broth
1 16 oz. Can of beer or 1 10 oz. Glass of white wine

Cut up chicken into pieces. Heat 2 tablespoons of cooking oil in a 4 quart pot. Brown chicken in pot. Remove chicken from pot. Put one layer of chicken in bottom of pot. Sprinkle on top of bottom layer. Sprinkle balance of onion soup on top., put about 5 oz of one of the above liquids into pot. Cover pot. Cook on low heat for 1/2 hour. Add balance of liquids and mushrooms. Bring to boil and let simmer another 1/2 hour. While simmering you may add some sherry wine to liquid.

Point Methodist Church History

Church history is rich with contributions of women. One church group in the 1920's was the SOCIAL LEAGUE of the first Methodist Episcopal Church whose history is reflected in their minutes printed below and taken from the canvas covered, red leather cornered notebook which cost \$1.15. The minutes are printed as written. This is the 37th installment.

Dec. 1st 1925

Social League met in the church Parlors with Mrs. Alexander and Mrs. Oehne, hostesses. Mrs. Dicely, president, opened the meeting by repeating the Lord's Prayer.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Roll Call found seventeen members present.

Bazaar committees reported:

Paid out to Wood & Wood	.75
“ “ “ Independent	.48

leaving a balance of \$161.30.

A check was made to the First M.E. Church for \$161.30 and given to Mrs. Beulah Jones.

Bill for boquet (sic) for Mrs. Mythen .75 ordered paid.

She has been attending several programs in the Bay Area to enhance the Library. Noteworthy was the all day event with Caroline Fuller Bauer's inspiring READ Program – a kaleidoscope of ideas for storytelling, programs and art projects. Especially fun was the Performer's Showcase where the librarians could watch and select from dozens of magicians, storytellers, puppeteers and others for the summer kids programs.

The Richmond Public Library and Westside Branch has received a grant for internet access. Watch this space for more information and starting date.

Because The Friends of the Library has lost its storage space at Harry Ells, the Library is selling books in the Branch – 50 cents for hardbacks and 25 cents for paperbacks – Best Deal in Town!

A cash gift made it possible for Lynn to

buy "The Endurance" by Catherine Alexander for the Branch. This extraordinary book tells the true life adventure of the Shackleton expedition to the South Pole in 1914-1917. The ship "The Endurance" was crushed by ice leaving the men to drift on ice floes for months at a time, before Shackleton and five of his crew traveled 800 miles in an open whaleboat to get help. It took four relief expeditions, but Shackleton rescued every one of his men. This gripping account is vividly brought to life with photographs from the scene.

Another new book is "Ambrose Bierce and The Queen of Spades" by San Francisco writer Oakley Hall. Mr. Bierce, as you may recall, was the cynical newspaperman who authored "The Devil's Dictionary". Oakley Hall has interwoven an engaging mystery with a history of California in the years after the gold rush and tells it with commentary from the misanthropic Bierce whose Dictionary defined homicide as one of four types: felonious, excusable, justifiable and praiseworthy. Some Point Memories From Harold Shawl

First, I would like to say that I am saddened to hear of Dr. William L. Thompson's death. He and I were classmates in Washington School, Richmond Union High School and at U. C. Berkeley (1926 - 1930) and my condolences are extended to his family and to his brother "Chet".

I lived in Pt. Richmond from second grade (1916) until 1930, first on Montana Ave. and then on Golden Gate Avenue and have many memories of those days. At Washington School, I remember Mrs. Axtell, my second grade teacher. Also Miss Michaelran, Miss Morehouse, Miss Lynch and Miss Lucas as my various grade teachers, as well as Mr. Hunn, (shop teacher) and Nora Ashfield, Principal. Walter Helms was superintendent of schools at


that time. Incidentally, it was quite a thrill for me to see Mr. Helms, then 87, as Rotary Club secretary in Richmond at a meeting that I attended in about 1966.

The people in Pt. Richmond that I remember are too numerous to mention, but I note some names in your recent publications that are included in those memories – such as Bernard and August Bernes, Louis Cunan, Willard and Jane Spiersch, Palenchar (Joe), William and Andy Kollar, the Vloberge family, the Paasch brothers (Dick & Bob), Mark Gebhart, Pina Barbieri and many others. The Pucci family were our neighbors.

There may be a few of we old timers that recall the 1920 incident of the Washington seventh grade girls getting into trouble by throwing bread dough on the ceiling of the homemaking room.

The recent article about Ivan (Maj) Hill was interesting. I was on his 1925 RUHS football squad and remember our team going to Sacramento Hi and winning 32-0. Later Ivan was taking some courses at U. C. during part of the time that I attended.

The recent article (from Dr. Thompson) about the RUHS cadet camp at Leona Heights brought back some fond memories, particularly



about firing the Army 30 caliber rifles, that gave us sore shoulders. We also worked the targets in the (pits).

I remember marching in "Victory Loan" parades in Richmond and carrying a large American flag. The various Industrial plants in the area all blew their whistles and there was quite a celebration on Nov. 11, 1918 when the Armistice was signed ending World War I.

During the "flue" epidemic in 1918, everyone wore gauze masks and we either washed them in hot water or heated them in the oven to sanitize them for further use.


In those days, there was very little development along Cutting Blvd. and in stormy periods the waves would dash onto Cutting Blvd.

William E. (Bill) Richmond and I were cadets at the 1925 Citizens Military Camp at Del Monte. I had expected to be an officer in the RUHS California High School Cadet Corp. as a result of the summer cadet training, but the State ended the program that year.

I attended Sunday School and Church at the Pt. M. E. Church for several years, beginning in 1916. I think Rev. Hocking was then pastor.

My brother Louis (93), who died on Dec. 22, 1998, was employed on the construction of the Natatorium in 1923 before he started to Art School in Berkeley.

The tunnel was the locale for some after school fist fighting to settle some grievances



and this always attracted a crowd.

I remember swimming many times at Kozy Kove and at Keller's Beach. Mr. Keller and her son, Dan, were always on the job.

In those days there was ferry service from the area of the Paar Terminal (Wharf Building No. 1). I used it to go to San Francisco, where I had vacation building construction jobs in 1924 and 1928. The lagoon between the old brickyard and the A T S F. track was filled in by dredging mud from the Bay in the early 1920s.

The Boy Scouts (Mr. George, Scoutmaster) met in a building on Standard Avenue near the end of the street car line. On more than one occasion, someone greased the car track to watch the car try to get traction. We "kids" from the Point used to ride the Key System street cars to RUHS at 23rd and McDonald and would sometime rock the cars to get them into violent end to end motion as they rolled along.

I remember the big fire that destroyed the old Standard Hotel in about 1917. I recall Kenny's Cigar Store on Standard Avenue, Palmeteers Pharmacy, Henry's Soda Fountain, the Library and Saturday morning story hours, the band concerts across the street from McWhorter's Grocery Store, the bank on the corner of Washington Avenue, and watching (through the window) Standard Oil employees cashing their pay checks and receiving \$5, \$10, and \$20 gold pieces as part of their change.

The Bernes family operated a French Laundry on Standard Avenue. Shortly after World War I the Bernes family made a visit to France to visit relatives, and August and

Bernard related some of their experiences to us after they returned. This was a big deal in 1919 or 1920. They also were pioneers in constructing their own radio sets, which they later continued to do and became "ham" operators. My friend, Bernard Bernes, tells me that I was editor of the Washington School "Poppy" in 1921, but I have long since forgotten that incident.

This epistle could go on and on, but enough may be too much.

Gene Corr

Gene Corr passed away last month after a long illness. He was a native son of Point Richmond and was raised in the Point and went to local schools. The family home was at the end of West Richmond Avenue where the Loyd Christopher, Jr. family now resides. Gene was one of Point Richmond's great baseball players that time playing with Loyd and Russ Christopher, Leonard Smith and Chip Checchi along with many others.

He was a great student of baseball. He batted left handed and although was not a great power hitter he used to lead off and hit them where the ain't". Corr never did play professional baseball but played semi-

professional with the best at an early age and later with the University of California..

After World War Two, where he was a US Navy officer, he became the first base ball coach and athletic director for Contra Costa Junior College. He retired after many years of coaching, obtaining many baseball titles and championships over the years.

Incidentally, when he was playing ball his beloved mother used to attend every game sitting on the third base side.

Operation Pin-Wheel

Here is a World War Two story that is very interesting:

It happened on the Island of Guam in June of 1945. Japan captured Guam on December 10, 1941 and the US Forces recaptured the Island on August of 1944. The Port at that time was so crowded with US Naval ships of all sizes , including the U.S.N Randolph, captained by Captain Felix Baker. The Randolph was a 900 foot Aircraft Carrier that had seen considerable enemy action. The Captain received urgent orders to leave Guam immediately and proceed towards Japan but the Port was so jammed he could not maneuver as his bow was facing shore. Also, there were no tug boats available to assist him. Soon, there was a loud roar and the ship began a 180 degree turn and proceeded to leave port under its own power.

This is what Captain Felix Baker had done:

He lashed 5 airplanes forward crosswise and 5 planes aft crosswise and had the engines start with full power. The ship turned on a dime. Thus was born "Operation Pin-Wheel", a maneuver that is still used today.

Sports Memories

I was never able to see the great Joe DiMaggio play baseball for the New York Yankees but did see him play when he first started in San Francisco. DiMaggio started his baseball career in 1933 when he was signed to play for the San Francisco Seals of the Pacific Coast League which was a highly competitive AAA League Baseball organization.


At the age of 17, he was a great baseball sensation playing shortstop before switching to the outfield position. He made his Major League debut in 1936 with the New York Yankees where he played for 13 years.

In 1941, he set a 56 game hitting streak record that still stands. Incidentally, helping him set that record was Richmond's own Johnny Babich, a great pitcher for the Philadelphia Athletics. Joe DiMaggio got his 40th hit off of Babich on June 28, 1941 and his 46th straight hit against Babich on July 6,

1941. Joe DiMaggio died on March 8, 1999.

Richmond's Willie McGee still loves to play the game of baseball at the age of 40. We have all watched the great career of Willie McGee since he first started playing baseball in Richmond's sand lots at Harry Ell's High School. He started playing professionally in 1977 and will probably play for the St. Louis Cardinals this year. We rate him the best professional baseball player that was raised in Richmond.

As far as great baseball players who were raised in the Point, I can only refer to players who played during my time which was in the early thirties. Before then, names like the Bonos, the Westmans and the Caseys are mentionable.


In response to Ed Garrard's letter in the last issue.




Deaths....
